## Designer Spotlight: Jason Yenter



At the tender age of 13, Jason Yenter spent his afternoons reshelving bolts of fabric in his mother's Seattle quilt shop. Knee deep in quilting cotton, I'm sure he never imagined his future as a world-famous fabric designer! Decades later, Jason has designed more fabric than could have ever fit in that little 400-square foot shop! His prints are full of fantasy, and

with digital printing he is able to produce colors as vivid as your loveliest dreams! IN THE BEGINNING FABRICS The Art of Fabric TM Established 1977

In The Beginning was started in Seattle, Washington, as a retail store in 1977 by Sharon Evans Yenter. It was Sharon's goal to fill quilters' & crafters' need for high-quality cotton fabrics, classes, inspiration, and friendship. Over the years In The Beginning grew from a tiny loft space into an over 6,000-square-foot quilters' paradise. In 1996 a new division was added to the company and In The Beginning Fabrics was born. Jason designed his first collection: *Atlantis*. This new addition's purpose was to create beautiful and innovative cotton fabrics to be sold at independent fabric shops across the U.S.A. and around the world.

Since then Jason has created upteen collections with his patterns printed on almost two million yards of cotton, men's shirts and even paper products for Michael's. No longer finding time to sew, Jason designs quilts and produces quilt books—often coordinating with specific fabric collections.

In 2005, the decision was made to close the retail store and concentrate solely on creating fabrics. Both mother & son now spend the bulk of their time personally designing or working with other artists to design the twelve to fourteen collections the company produces each year. The company also produces a variety of books, patterns and free handouts.

Or to keep current, join their email list with chances to win monthly prizes!

Another site you need to check out is <u>https://okanarts.com/jason-yenter/</u>. You don't even need to read the captions under the pictures as they say it all!!! Oh my goodness...I will give you a brief synopsis from the site by the interviewer.

"Visiting In The Beginning Fabrics corporate headquarters, I first stepped into a welcoming showroom. I found Jason, now President/Creative Director, in his office brimming with printouts of fabric collections—taped to the wall, on the floor and on all horizontal surfaces. Even his computer screen displayed fabric patterns.

Besides designing his own collections, Jason collaborates with a cadre of artists to develop 12 to 14 collections every year. Even though In The Beginning Fabrics has a warehouse across town, tons of fabric filled the backrooms of the sprawling one-story building.

As we finished up our time together, Jason spoke passionately about In The Beginning's role in making fabrics for quilters. "Quilts are heirlooms that are handed down from generation to generation. In 100 years from now, people will be looking at quilts with our fabrics in them! We're creating New History here."

He also talked about Sharon. "*I'm so proud of my mom*. *She's created a legacy*." Sharon and Jason—a mother and son—have brought color, pattern, and a love of quilting to others. They've made delightful contributions to quilters in Seattle and around the world for almost 40 years."

The CCQG Workshop Committee is excited to introduce the two teachers we have scheduled for 2019. We hope you are able to come join us to learn some new techniques and patterns.

**\*** SNOWFLAKE DRESDEN PLATES will be held Thursday, May 16<sup>th</sup> from 9:30 am-3:30 pm

at the Marquette County Service Center located at 480 Underwood Avenue in Montello.

Our instructor for the day will be Christopher Weinhold from Wisconsin Rapids. Chris is a retired kindergarten teacher and happens to have a sister who owns Quilt-agiou in Mukwonago, WI.

Make this great Snowflake Dresden plate table runner using a 15-degree ruler. The finished size is 18x48-inches on the pattern, but the snowflakes can be used on any size table runner, placemats, wall hangings or lap quilt.

Cost for the day is \$33.00/workshop which includes pattern. Ruler extra/available to order NOTE: We need to have your ruler order by April 12th.

Registration open to members until March 29th after which time the general public will be invited to attend.

DOUBLE WEDDING RING-SANDY'S METHOD will be held Thursday, June 20<sup>th</sup> from 9:00 am until 3:00 pm at the Marquette County Service Center located at 480 Underwood Avenue in Montello.

When we think of June, we think of brides & weddings...so the Workshop Committee has scheduled a Double Wedding Ring workshop for you.

Sandy Mason will be our instructor. Sandy along with her husband, Ron, owned and operated Quilts & Quilting in Princeton, Wisconsin for 38 years. She was also the 1<sup>st</sup> longarm quilter in Wisconsin.

Sandy admired the Double Wedding Ring quilt for years but never liked the 'all curves' method. So back in the 1970's, she came up with a simpler method to

achieve this beautiful quilt. Sandy now has her 19<sup>th</sup> quilt top pieced.

This workshop will create a 36x36-inch wallhanging quilt. This workshop is for both the beginner or the seasoned quilter and anyone in-between.

Cost for the day is \$33.00/workshop which includes pattern.

Kits are available for \$39.95/each in either blues or reproduction fabrics with muslin backgrounds. Registration open to members until March 29th after which time the general public will be invited to attend.

- \* A very scrappy project
- # Can be 'controlled' by utilizing a pre-cut Jelly Roll & background yardage
- st Fat quarters would work but the color pallet would be limited
- ✤ Leftover pieces used in the pieced border

For those not wishing to create a larger quilt, directions will be available for a table runner. The patterns will be available the first day of the Retreat, but pre-cutting is encouraged - everything will be cut at  $2\frac{1}{2}$ -inches.

Jane began sewing at a young age, probably early grade school. In Jr. High she took clothing classes and sewed garments. She made my own wedding dress and a number of formals/bridesmaid dresses. She took some Stretch & Sew classes while living in Milwaukee and even made a bathing suit!

Jane didn't take up quilting until the 90's, and she hasn't stopped since! In late 2007, Dianne Larson (the previous owner of Mill House Quilts) asked her to design a Mystery Quilt for the shop-she has designed patterns for them ever since then.

About that same time, she was asked to host a *Strip Club* at Mill House Quilts, which has met every second Thursday since then. The gals that come have been testers for blocks she has designed. They still laugh about being the only *Strip Club* in Waunakee!

In 2011, Dianne gave Jane the name of an editor at <u>Fons and Porter Magazine</u>. She has a wonderful relation with a new Diane, and has done a number of quilts for their magazines. The most recent was in their new publication, <u>Precut Patchwork</u>, the January 2019 issue.

Last year, Jane decided to self-publish her patterns and sells them to quilt clubs and guilds as well as shops. Jane loves the challenge of designing & making quilts and will "retire" when it is no longer fun.

## HAPPY 40th ANNIVERSARY!!!

Have your heard the news?!? This year is the 40<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the "how-would-we-EVER-quilt-without-it-tool":

#### THE ROTARY CUTTER!

The traditional symbol of a 40<sup>th</sup> anniversary is a ruby. So what did OLFA do to mark their milestone? Why, they invented the OLFA RubyRotary Cutter, of course.

Here's a fun little history lesson for you: In 1979, Mr. Yoshio Okada, founder of OLFA, introduced the rotary cutter to the marketplace. The Japan-based company had been making snap-off blades for other uses (the name OLFA comes from two Japanese words that mean "break the blade") when Mr. Okada had the idea to develop a rolling cutter. His invention revolutionized quilt making, and by the early 1980s, rotary cutters were being adopted by quilters everywhere.

Fast forward to today, when quilters around the world agree: you need a sewing machine, a rotary cutter, and a rotary-cutting mat and ruler to begin.

Curious???




